In a particularly prolific year, The New York Times best-selling author Karen White is releasing her second page-turner of 2014 with A Long Time Gone on June 3 (\$26, NAL Hardcover). Return to Tradd Street came out in January, and the anthology Grand Central is out next month. Here, the Alpharetta-based wordsmith dishes on inspiration, the South and getting her stories on the small screen.

#### What was the inspiration for A Long Time Gone?

I love multigenerational books, and I especially love books that explore the mother-daughter relationship.



I'm also a huge history buff, so I wanted to explore the great Mississippi River flood of 1927.

# Do you have a personal connection to the Mississippi Delta?

My mother was born and raised in the Delta, and I spent summers as a child at my grandmother's house in

Indianola, Miss. The Delta is called the 'most Southern place on Earth' and is so special. I can't believe it took me this long to make it the setting for a book!

### We're glad you did! You've written 18 books to date. Where do you typically write?

I live about 35 miles north of Atlanta in Milton horse country. My favorite writing spot is on my screened porch that overlooks our backyard and the pasture behind it.

## When you need to get away, where do you go?

We have a beach house on the Gulf Coast of Florida. I go there as often as I can (only my dog is allowed), and I'm so productive. We've got three porches—all of which I call my 'writing porches,' just in case anybody else has the nerve to try and claim them.

### Can fans expect to see your books on the big or small screen?
